What is the Food Issues Census Survey?

The Food Issues Census is a project to understand the organisations and communities working in and organising around key food-related issues across the UK. We want to know what you're working on, what issues you feel are most important, how you're funded, and what you need in order to meet the challenges of today.

Crucially, this is an opportunity for you to share your priorities with funders.

By gathering and analysing responses, we aim to:

- Create a shared picture of the sector.
- Provide actionable insights to funders and organisations.
- Highlight the work and impact of diverse civil society organisations in food and farming.

The insights that we gather will be available as both **raw data** and a **detailed report**. This will not only be used by funders, but will be useful to participating organisations - to support your decision-making, advocacy, partnerships and funding proposals.
